Time to deck the halls, folks, because December 1 is National Christmas Lights Day! Before the invention of electric lights, families would balance candles on the branches of their Christmas trees—a risky practice that naturally led to several house fires. Electric Christmas lights were first invented in 1880 by Thomas Edison, who promptly strung them all over the outside of his Menlo Park laboratory. Because people were initially distrustful of electricity, however, it took another several decades for the invention to catch on. And it wasn't until 1903, when General Electric began selling pre-assembled kits of Christmas lights, that electric lights became popular with people of all classes. Today, electric lights are an integral part of the winter holiday season, and certainly aren't exclusive to Christmas. As we get ready for the end of the year, let's string up our lights and celebrate. 'Tis the season, after all.

World AIDS Day - December 1, 2019

First recognized in 1988, World AIDS Day falls on December 1 each year. World AIDS Day is dedicated to spreading awareness of the AIDS pandemic spread by the spread of HIV infection, and to mourning those who have died of the disease. An estimated 40 million people worldwide have died of AIDS since 1981, and an estimated 37 million are living with HIV, making it one of the most important global public health issues in recorded history. Despite recent improvements in treatment, the AIDS epidemic still claims an estimated two million lives each year, of which more than 250,000 are children.

Rosa Parks Day honors an American Civil Rights hero. On either February 4 or December 1, the holiday recognizes the civil rights leader Rosa Parks.

African American leaders, including E.D. Nixon and Martin Luther King, Jr.), organized the Montgomery Bus Boycott for the day of Rosa Park's trial. The boycott succeeded and lasted several months, devastating the transportation system in Montgomery.





A PRAYER FOR MY CHILD'S



With over 40 publications to his credit, Mark has served on the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) Board of Directors and Executive Committee, and recently published a book about creating productive mathematics learning environments for diverse students. He is best known for his collaborative work with educators in developing strategies that help students understand concepts, supporting instruction, and addressing issues of equity in education.

Ready Classroom Mathematics

Establishing Classroom Environments That Support Mathematical Discourse

Classroom environments that are rich in mathematical discourse are ones where all students have a voice. They learn to think critically, discuss the arguments of others, and collaborate to solve problems. Students build conceptual understanding and a growth mindset. Encouraging and supporting teachers to embrace new strategies is critical for success.

Here are seven effective strategies to start using now.

- 1 Help students work with and rely on one another.**
Rules such as "Ask three before you ask me" can help establish classroom expectations by encouraging students to seek assistance from peers before defaulting to the teacher.
- 2 Allow students to work independently before sharing in small or large groups.**
Students need time to gather their thoughts and identify what they know or do not know before they are exposed to the influence of other students.
- 3 Use questions and prompts to encourage students to listen to each other.**
Ask students to clarify or restate peers' comments using the language of mathematics. Teach students to respectfully critique the reasoning of their peers and disagree amicably.
- 4 Use questions strategically to engage students in mathematical discourse.**
Teachers can engage students in mathematical discourse by posing questions that encourage discussion and debate and that require students to attend to particular aspects of the learning process and explain and justify their thinking.
- 5 Acknowledge the importance of mistakes in learning and understanding.**
Remind students constantly that errors are expected and natural and that they can be a good thing because they lead to enhanced learning. Help students recognize what they have learned by analyzing their mistakes and identifying misunderstandings.
- 6 Use collaborative learning strategies to support students in preparation for whole class discussions.**
When students work with peers or in small groups, they are able to take risks and build confidence on a small scale before they present solutions to the whole class.
- 7 Use a variety of pedagogical strategies to engage all students in whole class, teacher-led mathematics discussion.**
To support mathematical discourse, teachers must always bear in mind which students volunteer most often, and they must also avoid always calling on the students with the correct answers first. Teachers can use a variety of methods to gather information from the whole class or call on students.

The Top 5 Benefits of Rich Math Tasks

- 1 Deepen understanding through real-world situations**
It's crucial to provide students with an understanding that the math they are learning in school is meaningful and relevant. A rich task helps students make connections and develop deeper understanding, rather than seeing math as a series of unrelated facts and calculations.
- 2 Make math accessible to all students**
A good task is accessible to all learners and allows them to attempt the problem with confidence. Students make sense of the task as a class and then persevere in solving the problem in ways that build on their previous knowledge and make sense to them individually.
- 3 Allow for multiple solution strategies**
Rich tasks lend themselves to a variety of solution strategies and representations, including concrete, visual, mathematical, and numerical approaches. When teachers welcome and celebrate a variety of approaches and strategies, students see that there is more than one way to approach a problem. This helps them to become more confident in their abilities, learn from one another, and develop a growth mindset.
- 4 Integrate student collaboration and discussion**
After making sense of the task as a group, students then work independently, with encouragement from the teacher as needed. After students have attempted a solution strategy, they then discuss the similarities and differences in their approaches and representations with a partner and then with the whole class. Students learn from their peers, seeing strategies similar to and different from their own, and those that may be more efficient. Struggling students also gain confidence in their ability to solve problems when they are given an opportunity to explain their strategies and critique the reasoning of others.
- 5 Engage students in learning and persevering**
When students are engaged in learning and encouraged to think, they persevere in solving problems. Students learn to persevere and creatively seek out ways to apply what they know to solve a difficult problem, rather than give up. A rich task will allow students to try another way or use pictures or concrete tools to help support them.
