"LACKING EDUCATIONAL VALUE AND HISTORICAL ACCURACY" R E A L L Y ? ? ? ??

So, says the Florida Department of Education in their January 12, 2023 decision to ban an AP African American Studies Course. What's inaccurate or of no educational value about: African men and women who were stolen from our homeland, stuffed into the hulls of slave ships (like packed sardines in a can), we were savagely shackled, beaten with whips, denied food, forced to renounce our African names, brought to a strange land, stripped naked and body parts examined in open slave markets sold to the highest bidder, families separated, children pulled from the arms of their mothers, we were forced to work on farms and plantations from sunup to sunset in the scorching heat; picked the cotton, tobacco and other crops that lead to the original wealth of White America, our men called 'boy' and 'nigger', our women were raped by their white masters, we weren't considered citizens, our women nursed little white babies on one breast and their own child on the other breast, we were the nannies, cooks, seamstresses, carpenters, concubines; worked as sharecroppers, cheated of wages, tarred and feathered, lynched, laid the rails for the US railroad system, terrorized and massacred by the hate group Ku Klux Klan, separate and unequal schools, denied patents for inventions that profited and made whites rich, denied voting rights, forced to live in slums and ghettos, served unjust prison sentences for petty crimes and protesting for civil rights, denied economic, health, housing, and political opportunities; driving while Black, affirmative action, sit-ins, bus boycotts, The March on Washington (1963), the Assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the Tulsa Race Massacre, Reparations, Emmett Till, Plessy v. Ferguson, Brown v. Board of Education, whites only (drinking fountains, bathrooms, buses, movie theaters, hotels, clubs), redlining, police choke holds, the War on Drugs and Mass Incarceration, The Schools to Prison Pipeline, tainted drinking water, George Floyd, the first Black President and First Lady, Black scientists, entrepreneurs, politicians, Religious leaders, educators, activists, entertainers, sports, law, business, military (Tuskegee Airmen); racial profiling, School suspensions/expulsions and special needs classification ?????

John 8:32 says, "And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." by Sir Francis Bacon is "ipsa scientia potestas est" (Knowledge Itself Is Power). To Gov. DeSantis and like-minded individuals, this is not just about the history of Black people, this is the history of the United States of America. Through the mercy of God, may eternal rest be granted upon Tyre, oh Lord. And may light perpetual shine upon his soul, granting him eternal peace. Amen.

Sending the most heart-felt sympathy to Mrs. Row Vaugn Wells, mother, and Mr. Rodney Wells, stepfather, as they mourn the loss of their beloved son, Mr. Tyre Nichols, during this time. As well, deepest condolences and fervent prayers are offered to his precious son, dearest sisters and brothers, his endeared family, and his friends.

When a senior member of our village transitions at a seasoned age, people not only take comfort in celebrating the life the elder has lived, but they may additionally take comfort in knowing how their departure has come at a time, and as a part of the natural process of living. This is certainly not the same for you all, and for your family. As with this sudden, horrific, and unexpected death of your child, your brother, your family member, your friend; it is unspeakable.

On behalf of my dear Sorority, the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Incorporated, I am requesting of our over 5,000 sisters and affiliate members, to pray the same petition and devotion of some semblance of peace and justice for you, Mr. and Mrs. Wells. Please know that I am certain that my sisters are so very, very, very saddened for your unbearable grief, your unending sorrow and tears, and your incessant heart aches.

It pains us deeply, as we share in the national grief over yet another death of a black male, and again by on duty law enforcement, and again death by a violent, aggressive, beating. This time, a 29-year-old, black male, Mr. Tyre Nichols in Memphis, Tennessee, who died three days after his horrific beating.

Having to deal far too many times before and during our lifetime, with the untimely harm and loss of people of color; of our loved ones departed with films, photos and videos manifesting more than the appearance of excessive force used on them; and the disbelief of how some law enforcement treat them leading to hospitalization, serious injury, and unfortunately, too many times, death. We must work to control these negative, defeatist, and God forsaken actions, in our communities and in our lives.

It is my belief that we must make vivid statements and take swift steps, all working to make our country safer for all children and adults.

Parliamentarian's Corner

Sorority Tidbits

"Roles of the Parliamentarian"

- Consultant to an organization.
- Advises the president and other officers, committees and members.
- Advisory and consultative role during meetings.
- Assist with interpreting bylaws and rules.
- Assist in planning and steering of business to be introduced (before meeting).

During a meeting

- Give advice to chair and, when requested, to any other member.
- Call attention of the chair to errors that may affect the substantive rights of any member (inconspicuously).
- Understanding that members may need to stand at ease for president to consult with the parliamentarian.
- Should only speak to the assembly on the most involved matters.
- Should sit next to the chair when possible.
- Chair has the final duty to make the final ruling. If chair habitually disregards advice, the parliamentarian may wish to resign at end of present engagement.

Member of assembly serving as parliamentarian

- Same duty as presiding officer to maintain a position of impartiality, does not make motions, does not participate in debate or vote, except in the case of a ballot vote
- Cannot temporarily relinquish his/her position in order to exercise such rights on a particular motion.

KWANZAA: A COMMUNITY CELEBRATION OF KUJICHAGULIA: SELF-DETERMINATION!

On Tuesday, December 27, 2022, the second day of Kwanzaa, was a time of learning, family and celebration! The National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc.-Alpha Xi Chapter (NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi), partnered with the Warrensville Heights Branch Cuyahoga County Public Library and affiliate organizations: National Council of Negro Women, Inc. (NCNW) Cleveland Section (NCNWCS), Cuyahoga County Section (NCNWCCS) and Western Reserve Section (NCNWWRS), and Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc.-Greater Cleveland Chapter (TLODGCC); for its Annual Kwanzaa Celebration, chaired by Tillie Taylor Colter. One-hundred twenty-five (125) participants came together inperson and virtually, to honor the ancestors, affirm the bonds between them, and to celebrate African and African American culture.

The processional began with African drumming by Sister AdeOlomo and the Kenyatta Company, and led by elders, NCNW Presidents and TLODGCC President, Anthropos (NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi Male Affiliate Group), as they danced their way into the room. The ceremony began by Celebration Leaders Grovine Buffington, Regina Franklin and Loretta Gray (NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi), asking for permission from the elders, and was followed by an invocation. NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi Chapter President, Denine A. Goolsby and Shalissa Smith, Alpha Xi Xinos Youth Group, welcomed the partners and audience. Monica McClelland (NCNWCS President), Kemberley H. Jones (NCNWCCS President), and Annette Leftwich (NCNWWRS President), and Lady Ayeshah Douglas (TLODGCC President), extended greetings; and "Lift Every Voice and Sing," was sung by Danielle Bircher (NCNWWRS), highlighting Kwanzaa's focus on African American history and having faith.

Essence Doucet (NCNWCS) discussed the history of Kwanzaa, emphasizing that for the African American community, Kwanzaa is not just any "Black holiday." It is a recognition that knowledge of Black History is worthwhile. She discussed what is Kwanzaa and how it is celebrated December 26 to January 1, culminating in a communal feast called Karamu, usually on the sixth day. It was noted that Kwanzaa was created by activist Maulana Karenga, based on African harvest festival traditions from various parts of West and Southeast Africa. Cassandra Carter (NSPDK, Inc, Alpha Xi) followed-up with the Libation and explained that Kwanzaa is a time of communal selfaffirmation, when famous African American heroes and heroines, as well as late family members are celebrated. As the ancestors and family members were acknowledged, libations were poured into the plant and participants responded, "Asé." It was very moving! The Candle Lighting Ceremony was led by the youth: Shalissa Smith (Alpha Xi Chapter Xinos Youth Group), Bryana Smith (President, NCNW Cuyahoga County Youth Section) and Teen Eugene Smith (President, Top Teens of America-Greater Cleveland Chapter). As each Kwanzaa Principle was read (Umoja/Unity; Kujichagulia/Self-Determination; Ujima/Collective Work; Ujamaa/Cooperative Economics; Nia/Purpose; Kuumba/Creativity; and Imani/Faith, the candles were lit in the kinara. African drumming, singing, and dance were performed by Sister AdeOlomo and the Kenyatta Company, followed by "Happy Kwanzaa," a celebratory duet by Shawn Roberts and Lady Ayeshah Douglas.

The celebration continued with a story by NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi Chapter member, Kwanza Brewer, President, National Association of Black Storytellers, Inc. She engaged students in a circle, asking "Habari Gani?" which means, "How are you?" and was answered with "Kujichagulia!" As the African Folktale was told about why the sun and the moon live in the sky, students interacted by repeating phrases and moving throughout the room. Bryana Smith read an original poem on believing in yourself and Bro. Ali Boyd, Manager Warrensville Heights Branch Cuyahoga County Public Library, gave a powerful message of Kujichagulia. Vonita Baber (NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi) presented Gifts of Kuumba (Zawadi), educational and symbolic of the labor and love of parents and the commitments made and kept by children. Acknowledgments were given by Tillie Taylor Colter, Kwanzaa Chair (NSPDK, Inc. Alpha Xi), thanking the elders, audience, partners, special guests and committee; stating, "May the candles of Kwanzaa continue to brighten the past, the present, and the future ahead!" "Harambee" which means "all pull together, was shouted enthusiastically seven times in unison. Vikki Pruitte-Sorrells NSPDK, Inc. Midwest Region Member-at-Large, closed the celebration with a Prayer of Kwanzaa and a powerful takeaway...have faith and translate Kwanzaa into everyday life, all year-long! -Submitted by Denne Goolsby
