



LILA GERALDINE MAKLE • Passed away on March 10, 2016

Lila, affectionately known as "Baby Sis," "Ma," "Mommy," "Gramma," and "Ma Makle," was loved and respected by all who knew her. In addition to her nine daughters, Lila "raised" numerous young men and women who passed through her home. Her home on Bonner Road was the hub of the community. Lila loved to socialize with friends and family. Her daughters recall the many cabarets they dressed up for, many after waiting for her Charlotte to put the finishing touches on her outfit. In her later years, she joined The Red Hatters and looked forwarded to Red Hat Hoots with her Red Hat Gamma Gals. Educated in the Baltimore City Public School System, Lila accelerated through advanced classes on all levels. In preparation for her career as an educator, she attended

Coppin State Teacher's College (now known as Coppin State University), where she received her Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Elementary Education and Maryland State Teaching Certificate. Lila loved teaching and the administrators and teachers she worked with for more than thirty years. She was a teacher's teacher. Lila joined her daughter Charlotte in the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc., Gamma Chapter. She served as a finance officer, hospitality chair, and youth advisor for many years.



BETTY JEAN DIXON • Passed away on December 31, 2015

Betty began her career as an educator teaching business education in Talladega and Alexander City, AL. After moving to Cleveland she continued classroom instructions, with leadership responsibilities, as department chair for twenty years. She later became a central office administrator for Warrensville Heights City School System serving as Curriculum Intervention Teacher (1999-2000), Mentoring Specialist (2000-2001), Staff Development Coordinator (2001-2004), Director of Accountability and Staff Development (2004-2009) for a total of fifteen years. She retired in 2009. From 2014 until her death she was employed with The Ohio Department of Education as a Consultant for the State Diagnostic Review Team. During Betty's many years as an educator and her pursuit

for excellence in the profession, she received many honors and awards which included the following: She was elected the 24th National President of National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Incorporated (2009-2013). Upon her election she charged all members of the 137 chapters across the United States to use the vision statement as a measuring stick to excite their imagination and give a surge of energy to carry out the sorority's mission and implement the three-point program, Y.E.S. – Youth, Education, and Service. Before being elected National President, she served the organization as national second vice president, national recording secretary, and editor–in-chief of The Krinon Magazine as well as many leadership roles in Midwest Region and several roles in her local chapter, Gamma Rho. Other awards: Interesting Personalities of Who's Who in Black Cleveland, 6th Edition; and front cover feature of Who's Who in Black Cleveland, 7th Edition. Her other affiliations included Delta Phi Epsilon Business Society, Delta Zeta Chapter and NAACP Silver Life member.



LAVERNE L. HARVEY • Passed away on February 17, 2014

Laverne Lillian Brown Harvey was always committed and dedicated to public education. In 1975, Laverne joined the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc.—Eta Chapter located in Camden, NJ. The Fall of 2014, Cooper's Poynt Family School dedicated the Library & Media Center in her name. In the Eta Chapter she served as Chairperson and/or member of the following committees: Youth Advisor (Xinos/Kudos), African American History, Teach-A-Rama, Founder's Day, Book Club, Public Relations, Ritual, Social, Civil Rights, Education and Legislative Affairs, Leadership Training, Children and Adults Benefits and Touch-A-Child. Laverne provided extraordinary leadership to Eta Chapter as the Tamiouchos (Financial Secretary), Tamias (Treasurer), First Anti-Basileus (First

Vice-President) responsible for the implementation of the YES Program. While Basileus of Eta Chapter, Laverne instituted the recognition of community educators and friends of education through the Torchbearer's Awards Brunch that was held during her four year term. A successful Eastern Region Conference was held in April, 2000 for 32 chapters in Cherry Hill, NJ under her leadership as Basileus. On the Regional level, she served as chairperson of Human Resources, the Credentials Committee, and other regional committees. On the National level, she served as chairperson and committee members. Under Laverne's leadership in the Camden Education Association, Eta Chapter partnered with the following organizations: NJEA, CEA and the Camden Board of Education to hold the annual Daddy and Me Programs (for fathers and sons), Mommy and Me Programs (for mothers and daughters) and Teach—A Rama programs. The Teach—A-Rama Programs focused on critical issues in education for educators, parents and community members.

The Messenger for the Public Meeting was Rev. Dennis Bishop, Pastor of First Waughtown Baptist Church. During the Public Meeting, the National Citation Award and the National Achievement Award were given to two deserving individuals.

The National Citation Award was given to a man or woman in recognition of outstanding contributions in the area of community and/or civic service. The 2015 National Citation Award was given to the Honorable Curtistene Smith McCowan appointed by Governor Rick Perry to a full six-year term on the Texas Southern University Board of Regents. She served as the 2nd Vice Chair of the TSU Board of Regents and in 2015 Councilwoman McCowan served as Mayor Pro Tem of DeSoto, TX.

The National Achievement Award was given in recognition of meritorious achievement by sorority members. The 2015 National Achievement Award was given to Member Chaleeta Hines. Ms. Hines is currently the principal at BRICK Peshine Academy where she services over 800 students in Pre-Kindergarten to Eighth grade.

Wednesday, July 15th, the VITAL ISSUES BREAKFAST had as its guest speaker Rev. Dr. Sheila Evans-Tranumn. She brought a wealth of experience and knowledge as a former New York State Education Department Associate Commissioner of Education, English teacher, assistant principal, and Director of Auxiliary Services for NY high schools. Rev. Evans-Tranumn has been education adviser to President George W. Bush and the U.S. Department of Education. Currently she serves as President of the Board of Directors of the National Council on Educating Black Children (NCEBC), an organization founded by the late Congressman Gus Hawkins of California. More than twenty-five states have adopted NCEB's Black Male Action Plan.

Rounding out a full and active few days, on Wednesday, July 15th, Gala Night was enjoyed by all. The entertainer was Terisa Griffin, a Season 3 contestant on the TV show, "The Voice". A highlight of Conclave was the raffle of the "Forever Connected" quilt. The quilt was placed and quilted by Dorothy W. Emery, Delta Kappa Chapter, Inglewood, CA.



The sub-title is "A Family, a Virginia Town, a Civil Rights Battle". The book details the closing of public schools in the county rather than desegregate the institutions as directed by the Supreme Court (Brown v. Board of Education).


While over 1800 black children were denied an education, white citizens used supplies and materials from these closed schools to build their own Prince Edward Academy. The Academy did not admit black students until 1986. The author/journalist is a product of Prince Edward Academy and a descendant of the primary community segregationist leaders.

Issues of concern addressed by the chapter were the disintegration of Black families (some children were sent across the nation to attend school causing a

breakdown of familiarities); the economic impact (parents without a basic education were relegated to menial jobs and continue in them); and the socio-economic factors for children left to lapse at home with no educated role models, breeding an undereducated population.

The author began her research due to her pending return home (Farmville, VA) and wondering how her own biracial children will be treated. Answers she had not anticipated are revealed through conversations with black and white community members.

An invitation has been extended to Ms. Green to attend a community-wide forum during the 2016-2017 year with local educators, social welfare and economic focus groups, as well as coordination with the Kanawha County (Charleston, WV) Public Library.



NEW EPSILON SORORS CONTINUE OUR LEGACY: "EVERY CHILD CAN LEARN"

Educators who comprised the 2015 Krinon Club are practicing that mantra in daily efforts. First, three innovative teachers based at Mary C. Snow Elementary School in Charleston, WV (named for a deceased Epsilon Basileus) have continued a spirit within the school that is today being fulfilled by these sorors. A variety of activities are designed to impart and improve the core skills of listening, reading and comprehension.

Soror Cheryl Dailey utilizes a method of building blocks for her reading students. After dividing into groups, each group receives a word imprinted on a card. The next step or block is reading a paragraph which includes the word, to determine its meaning through context (clues). The final block requires finding the actual definition(s) to complete the understanding. Afterword, the cards are rotated until each small group has had an opportunity to learn each word. Soror Dailey has been able to introduce a variety of subjects from Health to Social Studies to Health. T

Soror Carol Green regularly implements her philosophy of "Books Beyond Borders" (i.e. books beyond, and in addition to the classroom text). She introduced National Black History Month, by teaching the art of invention through science. Green was able to engage students with What Color Is Your World? by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Listening to brief vignettes about what led to Garrett Morgan's inventing the gas mask, or Lonnie Robinson, a modern day inventor of the Super-Soaker tov water gun, whets the appetite of students who were unaware of the brilliance of Black Americans. The combination of history and science in easy-to-read language serves to inspire, bolster pride and add to learning the diverse contributors to American society.

Soror Erica Woods is a 6-year Intellectual Disabilities (ID) teacher, who has utilized a variety of methods to reach students. One that has reflected much success is an exercise in vocal projection and social amenities. All of the students formed a circle facing each other. Woods then turned to the student on her left and said "Good morning, ex. <u>Victoria</u>. At first, the student only smiled. However, through modeling and practice soon the pupil was

able to return the greeting with "Good morning, Ms. Woods!" The exercise, which is repeated each morning, reinforces cognitive, facial characteristics and instills civil courtesies.

Across the county (Kanawha) at Dunbar Intermediate School, Soror Charlene Jenkins has a unique way to teach critical thinking skills through writing exercises. One of the most productive is "What I Think You Should Know About Me". Students must determine what they wanted to share with not only the students, but their teacher as well. After time is set aside for brainstorming about their individual talents and thoughts, the students begin writing a rough draft. The next step is teacher conferences with each for extrapolation purposes, Finally, students write and type their final drafts. Writing skills are improved, spelling and vocabulary are expanded, while students increase self-esteem by citing talents or activities of which others may be unaware.

Soror Nasha Williams-Irving, who has dual certification in West Virginia and Ohio, found a unique way to celebrate the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. She covered the 5 Dimensions for Phonemic Awareness and Phonics by having her class share words that rhyme with both "King" and "Dream". Students' vocabulary was expanded as she introduced additional words, such as peace, honor, and leader. A reading and fluency component was partnered with a Scholastic Magazine edition celebrating Dr. King. By watching a video of a young student reciting the "I Have A Dream" speech, students were able to test the context of their comprehension.

"EVERY CHILD CAN LEARN" is

an appropriate mantra for educators who subscribe to both traditional and non-traditional means to captivate and teach their students. Epsilon Chapter is a primary example.

COMPUTERS, CODING, CHILDREN AND THE COMMODORE 64 GENERATION

As I was sitting in my chapter's (Delta Phi) sponsored full-day workshop "K-6 Code.Org Curriculum" at Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven, Connecticut on October 24, 2015, I had no intention initially of registering to participate in the computer science program. Even though I was a self-proclaimed computer fanatic and had even tried to write my own program when I got my first computer – a Commodore 64 back in the early '80's – I was a four-year retiree from the local Board of Education and perfectly happy playing with my Facebook and online word games. I was attending only to help my chapter host the program offered by the CT State Department of Education in partnership with the RESC Alliance.

Our Basileus Tiffany Ladson-Lang had developed a relationship with instructors from the RESC Alliance and was utilizing coding in her Bridgeport, CT school. It was Delta Phi Chapter's intention to provide free training to K-6 classroom teachers, librarians, media specialists, technology teachers or any educator interested in teaching computer science. However, as I listened to the presenter and watched the approximately 30 participants getting excited about the coding activities and "easy puzzle-like" programming techniques, I found myself getting excited and when the presenters demonstrated that even children as young as five years old could program their own custom game or story, I had to sign up!

I immediately went online and started the Accelerated Course which was a self-directed combination of Courses Two through Four. The program guides the individual through computing concepts such as computational thinking, algorithms, functions and conditionals via a curriculum that scaffolds the concepts and skills it presents. My big moment of pride – I programmed my computer to "draw" a lollipop!

Now that I was a bona fide "programmer", I was inspired to pass along my excitement to some of the students at the school that I volunteered. My afterschool class consisted of six students from the Highville Charter School in New Haven, CT., an evenly matched group of three boys and three girls. Three were first graders and three were second graders. We began classes in November, 2015 meeting once a week and are nearly done with the 18 lessons in Course One. They enjoy that the coding experience utilizes word searches, Angry Bird mazes and gives them the power to "draw" different shapes and pictures on their own.

Delta Phi Chapter is planning on continuing its relationship with the RESC Alliance and to offer free computer science training to interested educators in the Greater New Haven, CT area. A Code.org workshop is planned for April 30, 2016 as part of a Teach-a-Rama and the anticipated number for the coding workshop is approximately 50+ attendees. Delta Phi is hoping to introduce more students, young and old, to the joys of computer coding.

She is Queen Mother of the Fabulous Red Hatters of Knoxville, which she founded in 2005 and is the



so that we may face the future without blinders. He is committed to being a role model of and for the African-American professional. William has a twenty-year old daughter.



DELTA RHO CHAPTER



Delta Rho Chapter celebrated the thirty-third annual Black History Bee in San Bernardino, California. The event was held at the Feldhym Library, Bing Wong Auditorium in February 2016. The Black History Bee is the creation of the late Ruth Ducket Gibbs, (Imani) of Brooklyn, New York. It served as a stimulus for infusing the contributions of African Americans into student learning in and around the New York area. It was introduced to San Bernardino 33 years ago through the efforts of the charter members of the Delta Rho Chapter of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc.

The Bee is similar to a spelling bee, however, rather than spelling words, students are required to answer questions pertaining to

Black History. Schools select 8 students, placed in teams of 2 to represent them during the competition. All questions are formulated from information packets provided to schools several months prior to the event. The competition is a three-day event. Third and Fourth grades compete on the first day, Fifth and Sixth grades on the elementary level compete on the second day, and the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth grades at the middle school level compete on the last day. The San Bernardino City Unified School District has 49 elementary schools, 10 middle schools and one K-8 school.

The questions are related to firsts in Arts/Education/Theatre/Music/Dance, Black Cowboys, Business, Civil Rights/Human rights, Religion, Inventions, Religion, Journalism, Medicine, Military, Pioneers, Politics/Government/Law, Science/Energy/Technology, Mathematics, Sports and Travel.

Third and Fourth Graders compete in questions and poems. Fifth through

Eighth Graders compete in questions, poems, definitions. Trophies are awarded to the First, Second and Third Place winner for each level. All students receive a certificate and a Black History Bee ribbon for the time and effort they put into studying for this event.

Delta Rho is dedicated to ensuring students of all ethnic backgrounds gain a greater awareness and appreciation for African American culture and the vast contributions African Americans have made to the world.

Delta Rho Chapter Black History Bee is supported by the San Bernardino City Unified School District for the past 32 years, and who has continued to support and ensure that this event is possible. Judges for event are District members, School Board members and Civic leaders. Coaches and parents from the schools are very supportive for their efforts on behalf of the students.
