# A CALL TO ACTION NATIONAL SORORITY OF PHI DELTA KAPPA, INC.

### AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MATTERS

WHEREAS, the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc, National President, Margarette Galloway, and its members, who are African American educators, due hereby make the following calls to action.

**WHEREAS** the first African slaves landed at Point Comfort (today's Fort Monroe, Hampton, VA) aboard the English private ship the White Lion in late August 1619.

**WHEREAS** the 20-30 enslaved Africans were traded for supplies and days later, another ship, the Treasurer, brought additional enslaved Africans.

**WHEREAS** the English colonists in Virginia in late 1619 *did not* invent slavery, however, the trading of Africans for supplies marked the beginning of race-based bondage that defined the African American experience in the United States.

WHEREAS, as stated by Luci Cochran, Executive Director of the Hampton History Museum, "If for no other reason, it is important we have a conversation about what took place at Point Comfort in 1619 because it forever changed the course of the country. The legacy of this event affects us all and understanding this complex history and legacy helps us to come together as Americans." (Source: Future Ed. Org)

WHEREAS the first Africans' arrival at Point Comfort began the system of oppression that shaped the United States history, tells us that what took place in Hampton, Virginia symbolizes the complexities of history of slavery. Hampton, Virginia is where slavery began; it is also where slavery began to end. (Source: Hampton.org)

WHEREAS, in the early days of the Civil War, three enslaved men sought freedom and made their escape to Fort Monroe. These three men's actions spurred a massive resistance movement to slavery and ignited a shift in the United States policy towards emancipation and abolition of slavery.

**WHEREAS** it is over 400 years that slavery began in the United States. The beginning of slavery is still surrounded by misconceptions and debate.

WHEREAS, today, in 2023 the misconception and debate about slavery continues and 23 state legislatures have created 47 bills to limit or prohibit the teaching about the history of racism in the United States. Sources: (FutureEd. Org) (Contributions @the 74 million.org) (Brooke Le Page-ThinkTank@Georgetown University McCourt School of Public Policy)

WHEREAS, states such as Florida, Alabama, Texas, Arizona, Idaho, Iowa, New Hampshire, Tennessee, Arkansas, South Carolina, West Virginia, Virginia, Mississippi, Missouri, Wisconsin, Georgia, Ohio, Kentucky, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, and Indiana have governors who have signed or will sign bills that prohibit teaching "diverse concepts" such as racism because they feel the teaching of

these diverse concepts make students feel guilty because of their race or makes students feel inherently racist because of their race, not being a people of color. (FutureEd. org)

**WHEREAS**, those governors, who either signed or will have signed legislation to prohibit the teaching of African American history, want to ignore and repeat the history of oppression and by redistricting the voting lines to lessen the impact of Black voters on election results.

WHEREAS, if possible, it appears that those same governors who want to prohibit Black history would, if they could, re-emphasize the Constitution of the United States Article One Section 2, which states that "any person who was not free (*Are we free?*) would be counted as three-fifths of a free individual for the purpose of determining congressional representation. The governors' changes in the voting districts want to treat African Americans as if we were enslaved again.

WHEREAS African American History is American History.

**WHEREAS** a historical knowledge is critical for a true understanding of the impact of slavery and race relationship in the United States.

**WHEREAS** the discrimination today towards African Americans has been determined by what took place in the past (history).

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that African American history does matter;

**THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. will contact Dr. Miguel A. Cardona, Secretary of Education, and present its belief that African American History matters;

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. will encourage all of its members to write their state senators and representatives, local and state boards of education to express the need to maintain African American History in the public schools' history and language arts curricula.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. on the shoulders of its eight founders during its centennial year (2023), will share through its members their history as African American educators in the United States in order to leave its legacy for African American History.







# Parliamentarian's Corner

### **Sorority Tidbits**

**Election of Chapter Officers** (Review section IV page 42)

- The Election Committee shall be composed of **three** to **five** members appointed by the Basileus at least one month prior to the election.
- Officers shall be elected by secret ballot no later than the May meeting of the election year.
- > The Epistoleus shall prepare the ballots.
- ➤ In a chapter of more than **twenty-five** members, a Soror's name may be listed under one office only.
- > Before ballots are distributed, the number of eligible voters should be ascertained.
- > If there is an even number of voters present, provision must be established for handling a tie vote.
- A tie assemblage may be defined as having a run-off of ten ballots.
- > Results of the voting shall be announced by the Election Committee immediately after the tally has been completed.
- Installation of officers shall be the last item of business at the June meeting of election year.
- All materials shall be transferred to new officers not later than August 1 of election year.

Secretary of State, Dr. Shirley Weber





She also taught at California State University at Los Angeles (CSULA) and Los Angeles City College before coming to SDSU. She retired from the Department of Africana Studies after 40 years as a faculty member and serving several terms as department chair.

As an Assembly Member representing California's 79<sup>th</sup> Assembly District, which includes parts of the City of San Diego as well as several cities and communities in

the San Diego region, Weber also served as a member and chair of the San Diego Unified School District.

Dr. Weber's genuine passion and tireless quest for equality and fairness in all sectors of life have resulted in her pursuit of reforms in education and criminal justice. Her equity-oriented legislation includes school finance and accountability, classroom safety, ethnic studies, early learners, attendance and dropout rates, quality instruction, law enforcement's use-of-force and body camera practices, reparations, the CalGangs' database, Affirmative Action, inclusive jury selection and instruction, predatory lending, resources for exonerees, restorative justice, racial profiling, among others. Weber has also pursued public policy changes related to health, senior citizens, veterans, and military families.

As a Life member, she still attends meetings and offers the chapter many opportunities to serve the city and the state. Soror Shirley Weber served as the National Parliamentarian.
