This means that our tax year ends on June 30 annually. When you file this year's taxes( by November 15<sup>th</sup>) you must enter July 1,2022-June 30, 2023 as your tax year.



## Parliamentarian's Corner

**Sorority Tidbits** 

### **Things Most People Get Wrong About Seconds**

#### 1. Every motion needs a second.

**False.** A <u>main motion</u> or resolution always needs a second when it is proposed by a single member. But no second is needed when . . .

- A committee or the board makes a recommendation in the form of a main motion. (See points 2 and 3 below.)
- A member states that proper parliamentary procedure is not being followed (officially named a "point of order").
- A member requests information.

#### 2. You should second a motion only if you agree with it.

- **Not so.** In parliamentary procedure, a second simply says that two members (the maker of the motion and the seconder) think a topic is worthy of discussion. The purpose of a second is to prevent one person (the maker of the motion) from single-handedly presenting a topic and potentially wasting the group's time.
- So, a second does not indicate agreement. In fact, a member could second a motion simply to give the membership an opportunity to consider the idea and reject it.

#### 3. Board and committee recommendations definitely need a second.

• **Not true.** Unless a board or committee only has one member, their recommendations to the assembly do not need a second. By the time a <u>board or committee suggests an idea to the assembly for consideration</u>, a majority of the board or committee has approved it. Since at least two members (people on the board or committee) have already vetted the idea, it's worthy of the group's time.





Her heart is broken when a next-of-kin or a friend dies


but she finds strength to get on with life."

## [ NATIONAL SORORITY OF PHI DELTA KAPPA, INC. ENGAGES IN POLITICAL ADVOCACY, PUSHING FOR FULLY FUNDING THE BLUEPRINT AT THE CAPITAL IN ANNAPOLIS MARYLAND FOR BLUEPRINT DAY 2023]

#### [ANNAPOLIS, MARYLAND, February 13, 2023]

On Monday, February 14, 2023, Gamma, Alpha Mu, and Beta Tau Chapters of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. joined with Strong Schools Maryland at the Capital in Annapolis, Maryland to ensure that the Blueprint for Maryland's Future education legislation is fully funded beyond the 2026 school year. NSPDK, Inc. Gamma Chapter Commission on Civil Rights and Legislative Affairs Committee, led by Chair Soror Sabrina Jones-Smith, spearheaded the participation in the Red, Gold, and Blueprint event where Sorors spoke with Maryland legislators advocating for equity in teaching and learning throughout the state of Maryland.

The NSPDK, Inc. Strong Schools Maryland "Collective" Team consisting of Sorors living and working in Baltimore City, Baltimore County, Anne Arundel County, Howard County, Prince George's County, Wicomico County, and Somerset County, along with other community supporters voiced the continued need for the full funding of the Blueprint. Soror. Charlotte M. Williams, a Collective Team member, retired Baltimore City Administrator and past Supreme Basileus of NSPDK, Inc., spoke on the ideals of the Blueprint that must be fully funded to sustain an equitable Maryland education system long term. These ideals included the 5 Blueprints Pillars: Early Childhood Education, High-Quality and Diverse Teachers and Leaders, College and Career Readiness, More Resources for Students to be Successful and Governance and Accountability. Soror Williams' voice for advocacy was echoed by the Keynote Speaker of the evening, Dr. Alvin Thornton past Chair of the Commission on Education, Finance, Equity and Excellence.

With signs in hand, Sorors cheered from the crowd filled with delegates, visionaries of the Blueprint, and others in support of these must needed changes. Sorors then met with Senators and their staffers to continue advocating for specific changes by sharing their own experiences teaching and living in the State of Maryland. Senators were presented with a copy of their county's Blueprint Implementation Progress Report, which outlined specifics on each school system's ability to meet the Blueprint expectations. The evening ended with the Collective convening in Chambers at the State House to observe a legislative session.

Strong Schools Maryland secured the passage of the Blueprint in 2020 and protected education in the 2021 veto override of the Blueprint for Maryland's Future by ensuring adequate funding. The National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. founded in 1923 is celebrating 100 years of dedication, commitment, and service to the field of education. In doing so, we stand with the Strong Schools Maryland Leadership Team and all the children, families, and educators that the Blueprint will support for generations to come.

I am truly grateful to be a part of this great sorority and serve as the Far West Regional Director! Kudos to National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Incorporated.




#### **Reading Across NSPDK**

#### **Delta Rho Presents 40th Black History Bee 2023**

The National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc., Delta Rho Chapter in San Bernardino, has continuously served students across the Inland Empire from San Bernardino to Rialto, as well as Riverside, Redlands and the High Desert. Delta Rho has organized the Annual Black History Bee for the past forty years to help students in grades 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> learn African American history and poetry. The 40th Annual Black History Bee will take place virtually on Saturday, February 25<sup>th</sup> beginning at 10 a.m. This will be the third year in a row that Delta Rho is having a virtual Black History Bee.

Students were provided a Black History packet of information to prepare themselves for this event. They have studied the information for the past several months. Students were asked to prepare a 60-90 second video from one of five categories. The categories are song, dance, spoken word or rapping, poetry (original poems), and speech. Each video will be judged based on a 50-point rubric and each category is based on 0-10 points. The categories for judging are stage presence/personality, originality, creativity/performance, organization, and overall performance.
