The National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Incorporated is a not-for-profit professional education organization of predominately African American women. Founded in 1923 in Jersey City, New Jersey by eight young teachers this organization today represents 3,000 plus members, 2,000 affiliates, in 146 chapters located in 31 states. This organization has weathered a myriad of changes in education within the United States and will celebrate its centennial anniversary in 2023.

Five regions throughout the United States provide the organizational structure for chapter support and administrative oversight. These five regions are: **Eastern Region** encompassing the states of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, and the city of Washington, DC; **Southeast Region** encompassing the states of Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, and Florida; **Midwest Region** encompassing the states of Wisconsin, Michigan, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio; **Southwest Region** encompassing the states of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Texas; and **Far West Region** encompassing the states of Arizona, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, and California.

All areas of educational teaching and learning levels and systems are included in the broad spectrum of membership: Pre-School, Early Childhood, Upper Elementary, Middle School, Junior High School, High School, College, Graduate, and Adult Education. Also included are specialty areas of Special Education, the Arts, Support Services, Counseling, School Administration and Supervision. Public School Educators, Parochial and Private School Educators, and Charter School Educators are members.

The National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Incorporated is governed by 26 elected officers and 214 delegates who represent each chapter at its biennial convention, the Conclave. The organization policies and procedures are established during this convention.

Support of youth, service to those in need, and professional support to enhance the skills of teachers, are fundamental program components of the **National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa**, **Incorporated**. Mentoring, leadership development, and college scholarships for high school students remain at the core of the program Y.E.S., which stands for Youth, Education and Service.

TEACH-A-RAMA — THE LESSON IS RIGHT: QUALITY INSTRUCTION IN FACE-TO-FACE, HYBRID, AND ONLINE ENVIRONMENTS

Quality instruction is delivered by knowledgeable educators, enabled by good teaching, and learning processes that are facilitated in a conducive learning environment. Congratulations, Dr. Clara Walters, author of newly published book, "Leadership That Restores Hope in Public Schools in the African American Community"

ABOUT THE AUTHOR CLARA L. WALTERS, ED.D.



Dr. Clara Walters is a distinguished educator who has been widely recognized for her dynamic leadership skills in turning classrooms and schools into successful learning organizations, and for trailblazing for women and African Americans in secondary education. Her leadership processes and strate-

gies for school improvement have been utilized and validated by the many school leaders she has trained and mentored.

She began her career in 1966 as a teacher of English for eight years, and in 1974 she became a high school assistant principal for five years. In 1979, her appointment to principal of Carver Junior High School (1979-81) and subsequent appointment to Jones High (1981-90) made her the first African American female principal of a junior or senior high school in Orange County, Florida.

She was the only OCPS female secondary school principal from 1979 to 1987. During her tenure as a principal, Dr. Walters received local, state, and national recognition as an outstanding school leader. The legacy continued in 1990 when Dr. Walters was appointed a Senior Director of Secondary Education as one of the initial two females and the first African American to rise to that rank in the secondary education division of Orange County Public schools. As a result of her trailblazing, women principals in middle and high schools are commonplace today in the Orange County School District.

Currently, Dr. Walters is the Founder and CEO of Educational & Leadership Training, Inc. that specializes in developing the leadership capacity of school administrators, teachers, students, parents, and other youth leaders empowering them with skills to revitalize a culture where every student has a promise of greatness. Dr. Walters has combined her many years of research and experience into a training program to develop others who are in a position to impact the growth and development of children. She is sought after as a motivational speaker and workshop facilitator.




TEACH-A-RAMA 2022 — "LET'S TALK SUICIDE"

READING BOOKS COLLABORATION MISSIONS ACCOMPLISHED!!






VISION IN THE VALLEY!
